Ozarka Makes List of Fastest-Growing Colleges in U.S.

Ozarka College was recently named among the fastest-growing two-year institutions in the United States based on research conducted by Community College Week.

In its December 8 issue, Community College Week recognized Ozarka College as the fifth fastest-growing public two-year college in the US in its category of fewer than 2500 students. Ozarka received the rank of number five due to its enrollment increase from Fall 2001 enrollment to Fall 2002. Community College Week analyzed data from the US Department of Education to determine the colleges for their fastest-growing institutions.

President Doug Rush commented that the recognition is "indeed an honor for our college. If we are growing, we are serving our community. And

across the country, two-year colleges are serving students by being affordable and close to home. We plan to continue to provide educational experiences for lots of students in North Central Arkansas."

Ozarka grew 36.8% from the Fall 2001 to a record enrollment of 1004 students for Fall 2002. Four other two-year colleges in the State of Arkansas were included in the "top 50" category along with Ozarka College.

Ozarka College officials have announced a new scholarship opportunity for the Spring 2004 Semester. Former employee of the college, Verlene Lawrence is funding \$500 scholarships to four fulltime students of Ozarka College to memorialize her late husband, Doyle Lawrence.

Verlene Lawrence worked at the college from 1975 to 1987. She was the instructor for the former Food Service Program at Ozarka, which is

now Culinary Arts. According to Lawrence, her husband had requested that she make a donation to Ozarka upon his passing in order to assist students having a financial need.

The Doyle Lawrence Memorial Scholarship applications will be available on January 5, 2004, in the office of Admissions Counselor, Randy Scaggs, at Ozarka's main campus in Melbourne. Applications will also be available at the Ozarka Educational

Centers in Ash Flat or Mountain View. The application deadline is January 31, 2004, at which time they will be reviewed by the Scholarship Selection Committee.

Rachel Faulkner has been in the education field for many years. Ten of those years have been spent as an adjunct instructor for Ozarka College. She recently joined the college as fulltime faculty member in the biology department. She taught Seventh through Twelfth Grades at Calico Rock Public Schools. Faulkner is currently teaching courses at Ozarka in Anatomy and Physiology I and II, Microbiology and General Biology.

Faulkner's enthusiasm for her new position is obvious. She says it stems from having more freedom from the administration, as well as being able to spend more time teaching and less time worrying about the discipline problems that can occur in the classroom at the junior high and high school level. She adds, "My colleagues in this department are wonderful. Bruce Dietsche and Melissa Arnold have really helped with my transition into fulltime instructor."

With a Masters degree in Biology from Arkansas State University in Jonesboro, Rachel completed her undergraduate studies at Arkansas College (now Lyon College) in Batesville. She holds a Bachelor of Science in Biology, a Bachelor of Arts in Physical Education, and a



Minor in Chemistry. According to Rachel, teaching was not the first choice for her life's work. "I actually wanted to be a veterinarian," she reveals.

Rachel and her family live in Franklin, which is her hometown. She graduated from Violet Hill School in its final year, before becoming consolidated with Oxford to become Izard County Consolidated. Her husband, Scott is the girls' basketball coach at Calico Rock High School. He has been coaching and teaching for 14 years. Scott and Rachel have two sons: Cody, who is seven years old; and Caleb, who is 20 months old. Rachel admits that one main reason she accepted the full-time position at Ozarka is that it now affords her more time at home with her sons, which are top priority for her.

Like another newcomer and fellow spotlighter at Ozarka, Deltha Shell, the Faulkner's enjoy playing bluegrass music. Scott plays the banjo and Rachel plays bass. Another obvious pastime of Rachel's is attending basketball games and rooting on her husband's team, but she says she enjoys many different sports. She also enjoys working outside in her flower garden.

Lauretta Coleman plays a fulltime role on the campus of Ozarka College even though she is considered a part-time employee of the institution. Coleman takes care of the Ozarka College Bookstore, which entails a large amount of work. Coleman has been employed by the college for approximately four-and-a-half years. Previous to Ozarka, she worked ten years as a reporter for the Melbourne Times, and was editor of a small newspaper in Newark for a year.

Lauretta is from the Izard County area, growing up in the Gid community. She graduated from Mount Pleasant High School and she and husband, Billy were in the State of Washington where the two worked in the fruit orchard business for three years. They moved back to the State of Arkansas in 1959 and purchased a farm in the Gid area where they raised beef cattle until Billy's death in January of 2001. Lauretta and Billy were married for 47 years.

The Coleman's had two children. Their son, Gary, lives in Springdale and works as the diamond buyer for Sam's Club/Wal-Mart. Daughter, Donna and her husband, Charles Wolfe, live in the Sage area and have four grown children: Amber, April, Alana, and Charles Dee J. "C.J.", who is currently an Ozarka student. April was an Ozarka graduate who went on to Arkansas State University to obtain a Bachelor's degree. Lauretta also reveals that she has two



great-grandsons, Caeden and Tyler.

Admitting she has multiple interests and hobbies and has a hard time narrowing them down, Lauretta expresses history and genealogy as two favorites. "I really like reading about the local Izard County and State of Arkansas history, as well as researching genealogy."

She also notes, "Even though education is not really considered a hobby, I feel like it is important to learn anytime you have a chance. With education one can achieve just about anything."

Lauretta also enjoys classical music, quilting, crochet and other crafts. Anyone who knows Lauretta is aware of her love of butterflies. She says she likes them because of their beauty and grace. A big part of her life is being an active member, Sunday school teacher and choir leader of the New Home Free Will Baptist Church.

When asked about what she likes about working at Ozarka, Lauretta quickly answers, "Everything!" She further explains that at the time she took her part-time position in the bookstore more than four years ago, she appreciated the opportunity, because her husband was disabled at the time and she needed the job." She concludes, "If I have touched one life and made a difference for better then I feel I have achieved success."

Robert works for the City of Horseshoe Bend. Linda says he was very supportive of her decision to become a student at Ozarka. "I could not have done it without his encouragement and sacrifices." The Taylor's have three sons and seven grandchildren. Two sons live in Emmett, which is located in the southern part of Arkansas; and one lives in the State of Kentucky.

Chef Richard Tankersley speaks fondly of his colleague, "It is really great to work with someone who compliments the culinary program and my underdeveloped talent areas! Linda gives one hundred percent to Ozarka and is always there for the students." Linda reciprocates their working relationship by expressing that she and Rick have a lot of the same philosophies and methods of instruction. "We work very well together and I appreciate his dedication to this program."

Kid's Academy Educator Recognized Nationally



At a conference of NAEYC, National Association for the Education of Young Children, held in Chicago, Illinois, Verna Lee Grice, a

teacher at Ozarka College Kid's Academy was recognized for her efforts and contributions to the field of early childhood care and education.

Grice recently completed the Child Care Specialist's Certificate through Arkansas State University in Jonesboro. According to Dr. Beverly Boals Gilbert, Early Childhood Education Professor at ASU, "this training certificate goes well beyond the minimal state training mandates. Verna Lee's portfolio, which reflects her professional development, was an exemplary model and was selected for demonstration at this national event."

Gilbert commended Grice as well as the Ozarka child care facility and college administrators for their efforts on behalf of the children and families in Arkansas. "I was pleased to have Verna Lee share the types of instructional

experiences she has in her classroom and the contributions she made to the thematic study within the class." She further recognized Ozarka President, Doug Rush for his awareness of the need for being involved in the childcare field. "The effort put forth by President Rush and the other leaders of Ozarka is essential to the accomplishments of our departmental mission and goals."

Arkansas State University's Director of Childhood Services, JoAnn Nalley, presented Grice's work at the conference. Gilbert acknowledged Nalley's efforts in obtaining grants which provide the type of training that Grice received. "Without her hard work, ASU's Childhood Services Department would not be where it is today."

Grice began teaching the toddler class at the Kid's Academy in 1999, after earning her Associate of Applied Science in Business Technology and technical certificate in Early Childhood Development from Ozarka, in addition to a Child Development Associate (CDA) credential. Currently, she teaches the toddlers as well as serving as Assistant Director of the academy. Grice notes that she en-

joys her job and plays a big part in the children's lives. "I don't have any grandchildren, but I have kind of adopted these kids as my grandchildren and enjoy my time with them each and every day."

Regarding the selection of her portfolio for demonstration at the conference, Grice states, "When I was informed that the Early Childhood Department wanted to submit my work, I was very pleased. Then, I actually got to go to Chicago and attend the conference and I was thrilled!" She adds, "The whole experience was quite an honor for me."

Ozarka College President, Doug Rush expressed his praise of Grice's accomplishment on behalf of Ozarka. "Ozarka is very proud of Mrs. Grice's success in her pursuit of further training to enhance her role at the Academy. Her dedication to the education and care of these young students at the Kids Academy is to be recognized and commended."
