Ozarka Board of Trustees Hires New President



In a unanimous decision by the Ozarka College Board of Trustees, Ozarka will have a new President to begin January 3, 2006 for the new

spring semester.

Dr. Dusty Johnston of Mena was one of four potential presidents narrowed down from a nationwide search of over 90 applicants.

Johnston has a doctorate from Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas.

He brings 23 years of experience working in the community college setting to Ozarka, including six years as an instructor and 17 years as an administrator. Currently he serves as Dean of Instruction at Rich Mountain Community College in Mena, and has held that position since 1997.

Johnston will officially begin his new career as Ozarka President on January 3, 2006, when the new Spring Semester begins and Ozarka welcomes him to the community and the college.

Forestry Class Available

In conjunction with the Arkansas Forestry Commission Urban and Community Forestry Assistance grant which was awarded to Ozarka College for the third consecutive year, Ozarka is offering a continuing education course on December 8th and 9th. The course is set up to benefit arborists, foresters, master gardeners, or those who have homes or business property joining forested areas.

This course will allow for two hours of continuing education credit for the Arkansas Forestry Commission, the International Society of Arboriculture, or as two learning hours for the Master Gardeners program. Since this is offered through a grant project, there is no cost to attend.

The class will be offered at each Ozarka College location as follows: December 8 in Ash Flat in the lecture hall from 6:00 p.m. until 8:05 p.m.; December 9 at Ozarka's main campus in Mel-

bourne in the lecture hall from 9:00 a.m. until 11:05 a.m.; and December 9, in Mountain View, room 102 from 2:00 p.m. until 4:05 p.m.

Director of Planning and Special Projects, Joan Stirling gives an overview of the context of the class. "In north central Arkansas, most of us live in or around wooded areas and the guest arborists will educate participants in several concepts including: care and maintenance of healthy forests; the impact of weather, insects, and disease on forests; protection against forest fires; and many other aspects of forestry."

The lecture will be comprised of two expert guests in forestry. Dr. Tamara Walkingstick, an Extension Specialist in Forestry with the University of Arkansas Extension Service will present a one hour lecture entitled "Keeping Your Forest Healthy."

Laurie Pierce, Information Officer with FireWise will offer her lec-

ture entitled "Fire Safety at Arkansas' Wildland-Urban Interface: Living with the Natural State at Your Door." FireWise is a cooperative effort among federal, state, and private agencies to certify communities as "FireWise Communities" and promote fire safety in the wildland/urban interface.

This project is supported in part by the Arkansas Forestry Commission's Urban Forestry Program and the U. S. Forest Service.

No pre-registration is required to attend the lecture, but attendees should arrive at least 15 minutes prior to the event time for registration. CEU certification will be available at the conclusion. For further information, contact Ozarka College at 870-368-7371.
