Grant Funding Awarded for Amphitheatre

The Arkansas Natural and Cultural Resources Council (ANCRC) has awarded \$165,000 for construction of an amphitheatre, which is phase two of the current capital project for Ozarka's campus in Mountain View.

The outdoor amphitheatre will seat up to 150 people and be available for many different cultural and educational events for the college and the community. Ozarka plans to utilize the venue for guest speakers and outdoor classroom experiences, student organizational meetings, concerts, lectures, and other campus events. The amphitheatre may also be scheduled for use by different community entities for a variety of events such as outdoor concerts, festivals, or cultural enrichment activities.

ANCRC awards funds for projects that protect and maintain state-owned natural areas, historic sites, and outdoor recrea-

tion. In addition to the Grants and Trust Fund, the legislation also allows for a percentage of the revenue to be distributed to the Outdoor Recreation Grants Program of the Arkansas Department of Parks and Tourism and the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program of the Department of Arkansas Heritage.

Ozarka President, Dr. Richard Dawe expresses his enthusiasm for the grant award that will make this unique project possible. "Ozarka is already deeply engrained in Mountain View as the higher education provider for the area. The addition of the amphitheatre will enhance this relationship as an important part of the culture and heritage that is so unique to the Stone County and Mountain View. We are grateful to the many people who shared in making this grant funding possible and look forward to continuing our growth in the community and our service to students."

Dr. Dawe also acknowledges the donors who have helped fund this project. "The generous support from the community will allow this project to include some important features and equipment needed to complete the amphitheatre, such as sound and lighting, which are not covered by the ANCRC grant funds."

In 2009, the Ozarka College Board of Trustees responded to community needs in Stone County by approving bond sales for construction of an additional facility in Mountain View. This 10,475 square foot building is nearing completion and will house a student center, administrative offices, a lecture hall, multipurpose technology classroom for specialized classes in arts and technical training, nursing

lab and classroom, and additional general classrooms. Construction on this phase of the project is scheduled to be completed in July of 2011.

Construction of the amphitheatre will begin in the Fall of 2011. There are still opportunities to play a role in this project. 2011 Commencement Ceremony

Ozarka College graduates and their guests filled the John E. Miller Auditorium for 2011 Graduation ceremonies held Thursday, May 12, 2011.

The ceremony began with an invocation given by Ozarka College Vice President for Finance, Tina Wheelis. Ozarka College President, Dr. Richard Dawe, welcomed everyone to the event and introduced members of the Ozarka Board of Trustees, and dignitaries who were present for the ceremony. He also recognized longtime retiring faculty member Judy Cannady who served as Grand Marshall, leading the graduates into the ceremony.

Along with Cannady, Faculty Council Chair, Trish Miller and Faculty of the Year, David Mitchell also served as Grand Marshalls. A new aspect of the Commencement ceremony was the presentation of the Ozarka College Academic Mace to display during the service. An academic mace is a tradition for colleges and universities which dates back to the first universities founded in the middle ages. It symbolizes authority, learning and scholarship, history, reputation, and values. Ozarka's mace was handcrafted by woodturning artisan and friend of the College, Dr. Wright Pillow, who served as the primary architect and first Executive Director of the Arkansas Craft School. He donated his craftsmanship and presented the mace to the College in September of 2010.

Dr. Dawe then introduced Senator Shane Broadway, the 2011 Commencement speaker. Broadway serves as Interim Director for the Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE). He is a member of Governor Mike Beebe's full cabinet as well as the Governor's Workforce Cabinet, an appointed group of state government leaders charged with creating 21st Century jobs and skilled workers.

An Arkansas State University alumnus, Broadway served three terms as a representative for Pulaski and Saline Counties, and two terms in the senate. He was elected speaker of the house by his colleagues in 2001.

To begin his address, Senator Broadway congratulated the graduates on behalf of Governor Beebe and the State of Arkansas. He encouraged graduates to remember how they got to this point in their lives and to be sure and thank those who influenced them toward educational success.

He also reminded them to find a way to give back to Ozarka College and their community; as well as continuing to pursue their dreams beyond this point. The highlight of his address was pointing out to the graduates how they are an example to those around them.

After Broadway's inspirational comments, Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Mike DeLong, presented the class of graduates. Vice President for Student Services, Ron Helm and Registrar, Zeda Wilkerson introduced the Ozarka College graduates; and Director of Adult Education, Dr. T. Wayne Wilson, introduced the GED graduates for diplomas. President Dawe and Chair of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Ben Cooper of Melbourne awarded the graduates their diplomas.

Phi Theta Kappa and student ambassadors assisted as ushers. Ozarka College Board of Trustee, Larry Sullivan delivered the Benediction. Graduates and guests were invited to attend a cake and punch reception after the ceremony and to join the newly organized Ozarka College Alumni Association. There was a drawing for a \$100 gift card for those graduates who registered for the Alumni Association. Sarah Taylor of Franklin was the winner.

Students completing their studies with an overall grade point average of 3.75 or higher in a certificate or associate degree program are designated as graduating Magna Cum Laude. Students who complete with an overall grade point average of 3.50 to 3.74 are designated as graduating Cum Laude. GED Classes and Testing for June

The GED Test will be given at Ozarka College in Melbourne, Arkansas on June 2 and 22 at 8:30 a.m. in Room 516 of the Wyth Duke Adult Education Building.

You must present an Arkansas photo ID, a Social Security Card, and proof of passing Practice Test scores dated within the last year. There is no cost to take the GED Test. However, if you plan on taking the test at any of these locations, you **MUST** register by calling Ozarka College at 870-368-7371 or 1-800-821-4335 before the day of the test. Because of increased demographic information needed, it may be necessary to allow two days for the testing.

GED Classes will be available free of charge at Ozarka College in Ash Flat, Mammoth Spring and Melbourne during the month of June. Programs are available in math, writing skills, reading comprehension, etc. An instructor is available for one-on-one assistance as follows:
