Ozarka College Mountain View's new facility is up and running for the Fall Semester. For two weeks, faculty and staff worked diligently between Summer II and Fall semester to equip and move everything to the new building so students on that campus could begin.

Ozarka College will host a Ribbon Cutting and Open House ceremony on Thursday, September 15th at 11AM The public is invited to attend this event and tour the new facility located on Ozarka College Drive from Highway 14 and Meadow View Drive.

Anyone who is unable to attend the ribbon cutting on Thursday is welcome to come by and see the building at any other time.

During the open house, Ozarka will also plant a historic Gingko Biloba tree as part of an Arbor Day celebration that took place last spring in conjunction with the Urban Tree Grant awarded to the college.

Alumni of Ozarka College have been invited to attend the event and an alumni table will be set up with gifts for those former students of Ozarka.

Ozarka's Culinary Arts Department will provide refreshments for the open house.

The ten acre parcel of land behind the Department of Human Services building was purchased by the college in May of 2003 from Stone County. The new building is 9,322 square foot and houses five classrooms, reference room, offices, and restroom facilities. The fundraising efforts for the science lab have been successful and the new science lab is in the process of completion. Fall Lab courses are being held at Mountain View High School.

Ozarka College Mountain View currently enrolls approximately 150 students, but with this new facility, Ozarka officials are hopeful that enrollment will increase for that part of Ozarka's service area.



Fulbright Acknowledged in "Reader"



Real Estate Sales Course in Melbourne

Ozarka College, in conjunction with Kelton Schools Inc. from Jonesboro, Arkansas, will offer a basic real estate course this fall. Registration for this non-credit training program is available through the department of continuing education at Ozarka.
