National Library Week was first celebrated in 1958, as an effort by the American Library Association, the Advertising Council and the newly-formed National Book Committee to draw peoples' attention away from new technologies such as television and music and back to books.

While it may seem ironic that the library now is using this week to celebrate what was seen as a threat to libraries a few decades ago, librarians today realize that all forms of media—not just books--have value.

Librarian, Mary Ellen Hawkins states, "We have on display a wide variety of musical instruments and recordings from different eras, as well as a display on 'The Evolution of Recorded Sound' which outlines the changes in how we have listened to music over the years. Americans love music, and as technology has evolved, the format of our music has changed from hand-cranked Victrolas to computer-based IPods. Whatever format our music is recorded on, we all love it."

The Weaver Library is also playing Big Band records during Wednesday's lunch break in the dining hall and hosting an 'Information Hunt' for students to answer questions about music. Hawkins explains that students can stop by the library and pick up a questions form. The forms will be due back on Friday, April 7, at 3:30 pm and all entries will go into a drawing for a prize to be awarded the following Monday.

Hawkins concludes, "Come see our displays and join us in the dining hall on Wednesday to help us celebrate music and the library!"

Arbor Day Celebration a Success

Arbor Day was celebrated by Ozarka College on Wednesday, March 15, 2006 at each of its three locations in Ash Flat, Melbourne, and Mountain View. During the celebrations, a Mount Vernon Red Maple Tree was planted.

These maple trees are descendants from the Mount Vernon Red Maple trees that live on George Washington's beloved Mount Vernon estate on the Potomac River. The trees at Mount Vernon are planted in a "Hanging Wood" which was a popular 18th century landscape idea. The Mount Vernon Red Maple has brilliant autumn colors and cool summer shade. This tree was selected out of many tree varieties by the students, faculty and staff of Ozarka College by a vote on Constitution Day during the fall of 2005.

The Arbor Day celebration was attended by students, faculty, staff and some local city officials and featured Ozarka College President, Dr. Dusty R. Johnston, as the speaker. Johnston spoke of the origin of Arbor Day and the positive effects of trees on our environment.

The Arkansas Forestry Commission, represented by Urban Forester, Dan Johns was also present at the event and donated four trees to each location. These trees were given away in a drawing to those who attended the celebration.

After the Mount Vernon Red Maple tree was planted, refreshments were enjoyed by the attendees.

Additional Scholarship Opportunities Available to Ozarka Students
